

The Great Ericson Shootout

The dream was conceived during the America's Cup races in Australia, while watching television until 4:30 Am. Maybe it was the late hour that twisted my brain into thinking this would be fun to do in my own boat! Well the America's Cup has "come and gone". How many times I'm not sure! The crazy idea has remained in my head.

It was during the 1990 Spring Windjammers dinner at the Captain's Inn, when the "Cup" light bulb lit up again. Since the best racer in our club owned an Bricson 35, I thought it would be appropriate to challenge him to a match race. Enter problem number one. I own a Catalina 30 and have been trying to stay in front or catch up to Piccolo for the last three seasons. It would not be very competitive to match race in my boat. The only other Ericson 35 in our club was Anthony Colucci's Four C's. Enter problem number two, how to talk Tony into loaning us (me and my experienced crew) his boat for a match race with the Jarvisizer himself.

Well I guess it was the few drinks I had consumed that gave me the courage to ask, and I'm sure the few drinks Anthony had made him foolish enough to agree to let us race his boat.

With those problems behind, (I had cleared the challenge with my crew that were present), I made the formal challenge during the dinner. Before Bill Jarvis could except the challenge, his wife Olwen accepted for him and they started lining up crew. We set June 10th as the date for the event.

On the morning of the race, an hour before the Captain's meeting, the

challengers located their "Rental Cup Boat" floating in it's slip. We started to put the "Cruising Ship" into racing format. (Removed dodger, tightened standing rigging, and took off the garbage)! The large American flag was raised on the back stay where upon our competition hoisted their English flag. The course was set up as an Olympic course, triangle in shape with a double loop for the windward/leeward work.

The two racers set off down the Creek and out to the course. Pat Carlson had volunteered the use of their boat, Yacht C, for committee boat which we were greatly appreciative. There was a nice fresh breeze blowing that started our blood flowing.

Twelve minutes to start was the starting time for "all the wrong things to go wrong". Our foredeck man Ed Ulbrich looses his glasses overboard. I Ask if he has another pair and he responds "of course, back in Bricktown". I can't get my timex to go into the ten minute count down mode, Eddie can't see his watch unless someone holds it several feet away, and Piccolo sails in front of the committee boat during the starting ten minute sequence. We miss the ten minute warning so we set watches for five. I still can't get mine into the count down mode, so I settle for count up.

At the five minute warning I start my watch and try to layout a timed run for the starting line. Looks like we're going to be early, I call for a 360 degree turn to slow down, as we're coming out of the turn the flag goes up and the horn goes off, with *Piccolo* about 30 seconds behind the line. I was a minute off in looking at my watch and should have stayed on course. Eddie was still trying to stretch

his arm out far enough to see his watch. Oh well! We'll get them in a tacking dual.

Well Folks! It was downhill from there. Piccolo gained for a while, then it seemed like we were closing in on them. We never got close enough to read the name on Piccolo's stern. It's not that we did not try, our crew tried so hard that they tore the jib halyard winch almost off the mast and loosen the main halyard winch to the point where we sailed half the race without making any sail halyard adjustments. Piccolo stretched their lead to four minutes and eight seconds at the finish.

Would we challenge again? We already have! Next time, Hopefully, we will be better prepared.

We all had a great day of sailing, we all came away learning more about sail trim, boat trim, tactics, sportsmanship, and how to feel our way around the deck.

A special thanks goes out to Anthony for letting us get the kinks out of his boat! Eddie Ulbrich for supporting his local optometrist; Tom Dalton for trying to create a cloud of pipe smoke to fog the competition; Al Sacco for his great sense of humor at the appropriate times; Steve Zuzic for those great tacks that would help us cover if we were only out in front; and Tom Wright for always being two seconds ahead of my sail adjustment request.

Thank you again to Pat Carlson and crew for their job of officiating the race.

No handicaps, minutes to give or P.H.R.F. ratings, just a straight match race for fun! Piccolo challenged by Four C's.



Piccolo had a good timed start, keeping the race as even as possible both boats agreed to use their 150's. Piccolo made a bad tack early on the race but after that we sailed well, constantly monitoring Four C's position and tacking to cover them several times on the first, windward, leg Piccolo rounded buoy 64A about two minutes ahead.

The wind had veered steadily and the next leg was now an extremely broad reach, almost a run to 65. Piccolo went too low and lost ground to Four C's but maintained a lead.

Then it was back to Tices for the finish. Again a reach, but this time a close reach. *Piccolo* was moving well and seemed to be opening up the distance over *Four C's* all the time.

Our thanks to the Committee Boat and crew for monitoring the race. We rafted along Yacht C with Four C's and had lunch and the usual cheerful discussion of the race. We heard of the unfortunate mechanical problems on Four C's and would welcome a rematch when the winches are repaired.

Once again, Barnegat Bay had its own weather. The forecast had an 80% chance of thunderstorms with high winds, and the possibility of hail. It rained to the North, to the South and to the West. Yet Barnegat had partly cloudy skies with light and shifty winds.

The Windjammers Sailing Club is offering special skill-polishing cruises for the women members. These cruises will be given by Judy Swank of Northern Light. Sail Handling
Helm Handling (steering)
Basic Navigation
"Rules of the Road"
Instrument Use
Radio Etiquette
Anchoring & Picking Up Anchor Under Sail
Man Overboard

The cost will be \$10 per person; please bring a snack lunch.

Courses will be given during the week and on Saturdays, when enough people sign up. Please indicate the best day for you. Each course is limited to six people. Women who are not members of the Windjammers are also welcome. The cost is \$20 for non-members.
