



Memorial Day Cruise to Beach Haven

The annual Memorial Day cruise to Beach Haven is once again history and those Windjammers who didn't make the trip missed a fine event. Our hosts, Marlene, George, and Annie of the Beach Haven Yacht Club, were as gracious as ever.

The weekend arrived early for four Windjammers who were able to get to the BHYC on Friday. George Henkel on Goose I, Jerry Finsen of Neried, and new member Steve Borgianini on Sloop Du Jour were out of Mariner's Marina in Barnegat. These three were joined by Martin aboard Black Pearl. The group enjoyed a repast at Morrison's and regrouped later in the evening aboard Jerry and Helga Finsen's Gemini catamaran where the Hawsepipers (how about this, after one year, Bill and George have a name for their act. What act, you ask?) Apparently one power boat owner at the Beach Haven Yacht Club didn't like their act because he cranked up the power on his megawatt boat stereo system only minutes after the aforementioned group started practicing for the Saturday dock party. To say the stereo was loud is an understatement. People at THE KETCH (upwind and two blocks away) started singing along with his music. Outdone by the competition, we retired for evening.

Saturday was a marvelous day weather wise. It was warm, some might even say hot. Because high tide at Manahawkin was late, fellow Windjammers arrived later than usual. Most were in by 5:00 PM. The usual comments about the wind being on the nose were heard. How is it that every Memorial Weekend, Saturday's wind is from the south and Monday's wind is from the north?

After taking a final "vessel" count, we found that we were joined by the crews of the Snail Darter, Avant Guard, Northern Light, Piccolo, Wind Chariot, Shashay, Calisto, and Escapade. Wait a minute. . . did anyone hear from White Wave, Sea Tryst, Linda C, or Tica? They were expected but didn't show up. Tica was unable to make the trip but drove down for the day and attended the dock party. Craig brought his guitar and became the third member of the Hawsepipers. Sea Tryst was still out of the water. Linda C. was reported to be on her way, but didn't show up. Certainly she should have been here by now! Mike McCarthy was able to make radio contact. He reported that Linda C. had engine difficulties, effected repairs with epoxy, and had to wait for the epoxy to set. After a suitable time, Linda C. would return home. Mike offered a tow but Linda C. was more comfortable with her plan. We never did hear from White Wave. Where are you Val?

Because of the lateness of the arrivals, the dock party was a little late in starting. We did manage to get going and once again, we had good weather, fine food, and wonderful camaraderie. Dan Crook offered that it appeared to be a scene from Key West. The Hawsepipers (Bill, George and Craig in case you've forgotten) tuned up their rusty guitars, George passed out his trusty song sheets and everyone joined in singing the old songs, the sea songs, the folk songs and yes, we even did the Piney Punk Rock

Nobody will remember it, they can't even spell it) picked it up another notch. Everyone seemed to revel in this renewed vigor as they sang with gusto.

At this point, please recall the power boater that I spoke of earlier (the one with the great sound system). He started up his boat, a large, long Viking with twin diesels, at just this time. The prevailing wind brought his exhaust fumes squarely down upon our group of revelers. It not only rid us of those pesky no-seemens but of breathable air as well. Windjammers went scurrying for their lives. We were told that he had planned to take a group of friends for a ride but some of us thought he saw an opportunity to asphyxiate forty sailors in one easy step. Of course, it would be understandable for Bill and George to interpret this event in a slightly different fashion, considering this and the event of the previous evening. Windjammers were on their own for the rest of the evening.

Sunday dawned bright and sunny. Forty Windjammers gathered at the Engleside for a fantastic breakfast buffet. Once again, Windjammers were enjoying good food (again?) and good company. The breakfast was followed by a beach walk. During breakfast, George Henkel was able to persuade Steve and Connie Borgianini to lead the walk. Steve and Connie own Terra Nova, an environmental consulting firm. They both have a background marine biology and shared their knowledge of the shore with the Windjammers who were fortunate enough to participate. Thank you Steve and Connie for your participation in this activity. Your comments and discussion were appreciated by all.

The delightful morning weather deteriorated in the afternoon. BHYC members and Windjammers alike were seen putting on extra lines and battening down the hatches. Wind speeds of 45 knots were reported. After securing their vessels, several sailors went to the Surflight Theater's production of "They're Playing Our Song". No reports were heard before the departure but, considering some of the past Surflight productions, I'm confident they

had an enjoyable evening.

Back at BHYC, several Windjammers, who not protected from the wind and chop that resulted form the front, had to spend the night in their "washing machines". When we awoke on Monday morning, the winds had subsided to the 20+ knot range and we still had some rain. Because the forecast called for moderating conditions by the afternoon, most of the captains decided to depart around noon.

Three of the first four vessels to arrive were also three of the four last vessels to leave. Once Black Pearl, Goose I and Sloop Du Jour left, only Escapade remained. On the way, Avant Guard reported an overheating problem and requested assistance from Escapade. We monitored the radio to see if assistance was needed but heard no more requests for assistance.

Black Pearl voiced their appreciation to several power boat captains who courteously slowed to diminish their wake. This common courtesy is becoming all to uncommon. It was refreshing to share the waterway with these vessels. Previous to this, the captain of Northern Light was also heard to acknowledge a similar courtesy.

Once in Barnegat Bay, the sails of the three vessels in this group went up for a short but delightful sail to our marinas in Barnegat and Waretown. This year's cruise to Beach Haven had become an enjoyable memory of good food and good camaraderie. As an editorial comment, I can only add that it would be enjoyable to report on good sailing as well. Of course, there's always next year!

Tara and Laurentide Take Early Lead in Race Series by Larry Conforti

Race Chairman, Al Carlson, was more than a little concerned on the eve of the Windjammers first series race. Rain was forecasted for Saturday afternoon; many of last years navigational aids had been removed from the bay last fall; and only six boats had preregistered for the 1992 series of races.

Race day came and the sun was out, albeit only for a brief moment, Tom Wright volunteered himself and the CCSC dink to set a windward mark at Tice's shoal; and 12 boats were represented at the Captains meeting. Al was feeling much better, the 1992 races were off to a great start!

Pat and Le Zagaria volunteered their boat, Swept Away II, as the Committee Boat. Along with Jim Hardy, the Zagaria's managed the race flawlessly. The race was started on time with a perfect starting sequence. The work of the lommittee Boat is always appreciated, but especially so when the weather is not ideal for relaxing at anchor.

The Race Committee set the starting line off of Sunrise Beach. The first leg was a near port fetch to Tice's Shoal, a run to buoy "BB", and a starboard beat back to the Committee Boat completed the triangle course. Weather permitting this race would be twice around the course for a total distance of 10.2 nautical miles.

There was little doubt that it was going to rain during the race; how long and how hard was the question. Fortunately, a heavy drizzle only lasted about one-half hour. This gave Bob and Janet Wexler a chance to try out their brand new Henri Llyod foul weather gear. They both looked real sharp, and they stay iry.

The winds at 12 knots true, with very few gust, presented a dilemma for the skippers. The fleet was evenly split between large and mid

sized genoas. The f 2's may have been a little better up wind, but the larger sail was needed on the down wind legs.

The "B" fleet, larger boats, went first. Tara port tacked the fleet, and took the early lead, with Lunasea following her all the way around the course. A four way battle took place for third place with the boats changing position on almost every leg. Our hats go off to Steve Zuzic on Escapade and Dan Crook on Wendy-Sea. Steve sailed the race without a single crew member, and Wendy-Sea finished in the middle of the fleet, giving Dan an early lead on the most improved performance trophy. Last years "A" Fleet Series winner Bill Martin found his new boat Black Pearl at the bottom of the standings. Once the newness wears off, Black Pearl is expected to be back in trophy contention.

The racing was even closer among the smaller boats of "A" fleet. The four finishers were separated by only five minutes both on actual time and on corrected time. Freestyle took line honors (first to finish) but was nudged out of first place by Laurentide after the handicaps were calculated. Just as last year, the "A" fleet is shaping up to be very evenly matched. Everyone has a good chance of winning, and the final standings will go down to the last race of the year.

The racing skippers hope to break out the sun block for the second series race on June 13th. It's not too late to register your boat to race in the Windjammers 1992 Series, give either Al Carlson (609 921-1891) of Vice Chairman Domenic Venditto (908 458-0793) a call for more information. Also, most boats can use extra crew, no racing experience is necessary. Just show up at the Captain's Meeting 10 AM the morning of the race.
