

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Memories From the Fall Dinner



Memories from the Fall Dinner (November 2010) By Past Commodore Kelley Fahey

The fall dinner gave us the opportunity to acknowledge the noteworthy accomplishments of the year. Some were obviously more noteworthy than others. These prestigious awards are not

about pointing out other people's mistakes. It's more about poking fun at people who did something silly, who usually should know better. But sometimes things just happen that are out of our control, and sometimes we find ourselves in unusual circumstances. Sometimes they're funny, and sometimes they're not. Time to think ahead Windjammer Cruisers! It may be early Spring and waxing, polishing, painting and other boat maintenance items may be closer to the top of your priority list than sipping sundowners in the cockpit, but don't forget to take a look at our activities calendar and plan some time off this Summer to attend one or more of our cruises.

The cruising season kicks off with what has become a Windjammer tradition, our annual Memorial day weekend trip to Beach Haven on LBI. This is a good "shakedown cruise" as we never leave the comfort of the protected waters of both Barnegat and Manahawkin bays. The destination offers something for everyone. Weather it's taking the kids to the beach or amusement parks, mini golf, wandering the many shops, dining out, hitting the bars for some night life, or just relaxing on your boat you'll find something to your liking in Beach Haven.

Last year we tried something new, running two cruises at once and had great success. Since this worked out so well we decided to expand on it to offer more options to cruise in a group to more people with varying work schedules and limits to time off. We will host two one week cruises and two two week cruises this year! On July 2nd two trips will cast off from Cedar Creek. A two week trip to the Chesapeake Bay and a one week trip tentatively scheduled to head north to New York Harbor hitting Tom's River for the fireworks as well as Atlantic Highlands along the way. On July 30th another set of cruises will embark one for a week and one for two weeks with destinations TBA. Hopefully this allows everybody who wants to the ability to get out and cruise with a group for a week or more. The two week cruises allow for a much more extended area to be covered and to test your provisioning skills as well as see just how much "living aboard" you or your family is capable of. The one week cruises will of course keep us close to home but still offer the experience of navigating the Point Pleasant Canal, several inlets, ocean sailing, anchoring or docking in new locations, discovering much about both yourself and your boat and lots of fun.

Of course we have our moonlight cruise, a lighthouse trip on Labor day weekend and the overnighter at Cattus Island in the fall which are perennial favorites that are not to be missed!

I don't want to forget to point out another new little overnighter I had the opportunity to do with a few Windjammers last year that was a lot of fun and merited addition to the cruising calendar. August 27 - 28 is listed as "Boardwalk Cruise". There is a pretty cool spot to anchor on the south side of the rt 37 bridges near Pelican Island. You need to bring a dinghy and from there it is a short trip to a spot where you can land and follow a trail out to the street. From there you just walk straight ahead directly across the island (not far) and you are at the Seaside boardwalk! This is a great family trip with the beach and boards for both day and night fun. My favorite thing to do is eat my way down the boardwalk feasting on fried delights such as funnel cake, fried oreos, fried twinkies, etc.. (please consult your physician before following me down the boardwalk!) You also have the beach, rides, games, restaurants, bars etc.., so no fear of boredom here. 

FOUR WINDS Tips & Reviews² In

That brings us to another feature in *FourWinds* that we call "Tips & Reviews". In this section, anyone can offer their solutions for problems onboard, in the slip or when underway. Have you done all the research and purchased a new piece of equipment lately? Why not share your research and let everyone know if you love it or hate it? Please, everyone help out and contribute.

In the past we've had tips on everything from 'Simple Refrigeration' to 'how to get more mileage out of that tube of marine caulk'. This edition of FourWinds has some simple sail care ideas from The Ship's Tailor.



Let's all thank all our past & present contributors for sharing their great ideas .

Tips to make your sails last longer

- Learn how to adjust your foot lines and leech lines! Especially the leech lines! Tighten till the leech stops fluttering when going to windward!
- Do not use wood battens! Use fiberglass or resin battens! Wood holds moisture and will tear a hole in batten pocket if it breaks. If you must use wood run duct tape down the length on both sides before installing in the batten pocket.
- If you have a problem with battens coming out of pocket, use a small piece of sail tape (not duct tape) over edge of pocket opening at leech.
- Use a soft spun Dacron or a vinyl covered wire for the topping lift! Uncovered wire will chafe the leech and end of batten pockets.
- Temporally repair cuts or tears with sail tape (not duct tape) using a minimum amount to make repair.
- Hose sails often with fresh water at the dock especially after receiving a lot of salt water spray on a rough day! Be sure to thoroughly dry before furling or covering with sail cover.
- Lubricate sail slides or slugs with silicone or "Mc Lube"! Never use petroleum base oil!
- Use reef point ties only when reefing for a long length of time and be sure to release them before shaking out the reef!

In the past the WindJammers Sailing Club has offered a wide range of seminars on weekend mornings on everything from small engine maintenance to racing. We will continue these exchanges of helpful information because it builds lasting relationships between members. Hey All,

Came into Emerald Bay Marina yesterday, along with Bill and Margee on Tortuga, from Little Darby Island. A 5hr motor sail in some pretty choppy conditions, however we did catch a small Blackfin Tuna and a Mahi-Mahi. Nice being back here again. Our first time this year. It really spoils you with FREE washing machines/dryers, a well stocked supermarket (by Bahama standards) and a great liquor store nearby with free transportation. Of course the showers are phenomenal and there is a beautiful lounge complete with pool table, TV and sitting area. All this for \$1/ft per night.



After leaving Lee Stocking Island we went to Black Point and visited the school which we delivered all the supplies to from home. They were very happy to see us and could not thank us enough. We had dropped them off during the Christmas break so we did not get to see them in action. Needless to say Robin was "summoned" to teach the following day. Corbett took some pictures of the teachers and kids. We were invited to Rev Kevin Rolle's, also the Police Chief, surprise birthday party. A real feast! This is still one of our very favorite places. The next day Robin went over showing the Math teacher, Mr. Musgrove, how to make copies of the overhead transparencies and a few more teaching tips. We also met up with Solitaire, another Morgan Classic, and had a happy hour. The next evening's happy hour was on First Edition, they are from Roseland, NJ, along with Wind Dust and Solitaire.

Finally we moved on down to Musha Cay. We anchored behind this very private island. Google it. After some exploring the surrounding cays we moved down to Little Darby Island to meet up with Totuga who was already anchored there. This was only two miles away but, a whole different place. This island and Big Darby are also private but you can go onshore with permission. It also houses a small marine research center for the Univ. of Miami. The islands are separated by a 100ft wide cut. Big Darby was, so the stories go, once the home of a WW2 Nazi sympathizer. He built this fortress like mansion on the top of the hill and supposedly sent secret messages from there. In the 70's and early 80's it was taken over by drug smugglers and the two islands had three airstrips between them. Now only the remnants and stories remain, save for the research center, and a few private homes on Little Darby.
