HAPPY JACK- A Story of Good Karma Paid

On our 35' Catalina, Perfect Fit, Phil and I arrived at Great Salt Pond, Block Island after 30 hours of sailing thru the night. We were exhausted and looking forward to getting hooked up to a mooring ball. We called the Dock Master for a ball assignment and were told that we couldn't get one for at least an hour so we decided to find the fuel dock and fill our fuel tank while we waited.



At the fuel dock, we filled our tank with diesel and when we tried to start the engine it would not start - the batteries were dead. The dock attendant was not happy. He needed us to move our boat so other boats waiting for fuel could come in. I asked if there was a mechanic available to help us get the engine started. He told us we would have to fly one in from the mainland but it could take a day or two and wouldn't be cheap.

Just then a man walked up to us on the dock and introduced himself to us saying "Hi, my name is Jack, everyone calls me Happy Jack. I can see that you have a problem. I think I could help you if you're interested. I have lived on a sailboat my whole life and even though I do not have formal certifications for diesel motors, I am really good with boat engines. Would you like me to try to help?"

We gladly accepted his offer. He left for several minutes and came back with a gauge to check our battery levels. Unfortunately, all three batteries had less than 10% power. Happy Jack disappeared again only to reappear with a battery charger and he proceeded to work on getting our batteries full enough so that we could motor over to our mooring ball for the night. While this was happening, we told Happy Jack that before we left for this trip, we had a brand-new alternator installed and were surprised that we were having a battery issue.

Happy Jack told us that he thought he knew what our problem was. The new belt on the alternator had probably stretched during the ocean crossing and was slipping. The batteries were not getting charged. He informed us he would be willing to help us and that the tools he needed were back on his boat. He would dinghy over to our boat with the correct tools later in the evening. We exchanged cell phone numbers and he left saying he would call us at 7 PM to find out where our mooring ball was.

We finally got our mooring ball assignment and were greatly relieved to be able to tie up to the ball and finally relax. We were not sure if we would ever hear from Happy Jack again. Lo and behold at 7 PM Happy Jack called us and we had a great discussion on where our boat was located among the thousand other boats anchored on Great Salt Pond. In the middle of the discussion his phone went dead. We tried to call Happy Jack back but it kept going straight to voicemail. We were pretty sure we would never see him again. But as it was getting dark, we saw a dinghy heading our way. It was Happy Jack and he had found us.



Happy Jack told us that the reason we couldn't reach him by cell, is that he dropped it in the water and it sank. Needless to say, we felt terrible that he dropped it while coming to help us. Happy Jack quickly got his tools and went down below to work on our engine. He found the belt to be loose as he suspected and that our water hose had a leak, Water was dripping on the loose belt which made the slippage problem even worse. Happy Jack said that he could fix the leaking hose but he would need to get more tools from his boat. He told us that he needed to leave Block Island in the morning because the weather was turning bad and he needed to get home but promised us that he would stop by before leaving to repair the hose.

Bright and early the following morning Happy Jack again came to our boat via his dinghy with the correct tools. Within a few minutes the leaky hose was repaired and he asked us to turn on the engine so he could test it before he left. He called up to me in the cockpit and told me to start the engine and put it in neutral which I thought I did but it turns out I put it in forward. When he told me to gun the engine, I did and the boat jumped forward headed towards a large motor yacht. The two people on the motor yacht saw what was happening started screaming STOP! In a heroic effort to help, Happy Jack tried to jump over the running engine to get to the cockpit and fell heavily over the transom. He scrambled up, grabbed the helm and stopped the boat. Neither our boat or the motor yacht was harmed, however Happy Jack's leg was bleeding pretty badly from a large scrape on his shin which occurred while jumping over the transom.

At this point, Phil and I were feeling very sorry about all of this. We did our best to clean the wound and applied several Band-Aids and then Happy Jack got ready to leave. Phil tried to thrust a wad of cash into Happy Jack's hands but he refused to take it. He told us, I have a story for you:

"Several years ago, I was sailing single-handed in the Bahamas and stopped to anchor in a cove at a small island. In the morning, I tried to start my engine. It wouldn't start and after several hours of struggling with the engine, I realized I could not fix it and, go figure, there wasn't a mechanic anywhere to be found. I was stumped! A yachtsman in a nearby boat came over and thankfully offered to help. He told me he did not have formal

certifications for diesel motors but was really good working around boat engines. He spent the good part of three days working on my engine and finally repaired it.

I offered to pay him generously for his work. But he refused and told me the following: 'There is no need to pay me. I believe in karma and my request is that you help another person who may be in a tight bind. Pay it forward, that is how you can pay me'."

Happy Jack told us we were now the beneficiaries of his karma payment and it was our duty to pay it forward ourselves. We are ready!

Block Island Trip 2022

On Saturday July 9th, seven windjammer vessels enjoyed a beautiful sunset, while staging at Meyer's Hole for the evening. after a one-day weather delay. The seven boats included: Galena, Hannah, Into the Mystic, Island Breeze,

Lorelei, Dragon Fly, and Perfect Fit. At 0630, the fleet departed a calm Barnegat Inlet and set sail for Block Island, Rhode Island. The 145-nautical mile journey was the first overnight passage for some of the sailors while others had made this passage many times before. The more experienced sailors provided much needed encouragement and guidance for the first-time navigators. As the sun began to sink below the horizon, a full moon provided good visibility until 0330, and then we had a few hours of darkness until sunrise. Approximately six hours later, we arrived at Block Island, a ten square mile island lying about nine miles south of the mainland. In 1614, Adrian Block, a Dutch explorer sailed to the island to give it his name. He called it Block Island and in 1661, the Island was settled.



As the boats entered the Great Salt Pond, the hunt was on for mooring balls. A few of the boats were fortunate enough to grab an open mooring ball, while others had to wait until later in the afternoon to join the harbormaster, in a line, cruising through the harbor in search of available mooring balls. Eventually all the boats settled in, and the crews rested from the overnight passage and lack of sleep. We would spend the next four days exploring Block Island, through walking, hiking, jeeps, and mopeds. Several windjammers visited the spectacular Mohegan Bluffs, a 185-foot-high bluff overlooking the southern shore. The group met up for drinks, lunch, and dinner at several great restaurants like The Oar, where we left an oar signed by all crew members. When you heard "Andiamo, Andiamoooo" (Hurry up), you knew the Aldo's bakery boat was in the area. Their boat provides hot coffee and fresh baked goods in the morning and fresh fish in the afternoon. The island has a great town within walking distance, two lighthouses, and several great beaches to enjoy.




After four fabulous sunny days, five of the boats headed south, while Dragon Fly and Island

Breeze headed north. They spent one night in Newport, two nights in Cuttyhunk, and two nights in Nantucket. On their return journey, Dragon Fly and Island Breeze stayed in Cuttyhunk, Three-Mile Harbor, Block Island, Mattituck River and then a spectacular evening cruise through the East River and a non-stop trip back to Cedar Creek.

Galena, Hannah, Into the Mystic, Lorelei and Perfect Fit

headed 24 nautical miles due west through Block Island Sound, cautiously navigated through Watch Hill Passage and passed Watch Hill, where we saw one of Taylor Swift's houses. We sailed through Fisher's Island Sound and then motored north into the Mystic River to our next port, Mystic Connecticut. While visiting Mystic for three days, we docked at the Mystic Seaport, where over 600 ships have been built since 1784. We ate at the famous Mystic Pizza and enjoyed walking around town.

We departed Mystic shrouded in fog and slowly worked our way west through the Long Island Sound. Due to some stormy weather, we had a change in plans and found the Guilford Yacht Club as an alternate port. The marina had a large pool that swayed us to stay an extra day.

We departed Guilford, Connecticut and sailed 30 nautical miles southwest through the Long Island Sound to Port Jefferson. While moored at Port Jefferson, we had a fun evening with live music and appetizers aboard Galena, with 16 people on board. From Port Jefferson we traveled 35 nautical miles to Port Washington. Before reaching Port Washington, we motored through an intense storm, with plenty of wind, rain, thunder, and lightning. While docking there, some of us thought the world was going to end. Over the VHF radio marina channel 71, after hearing the Emergency Broadcast signal, we heard the following message: "We interrupt this program. This is a national emergency. Important instructions will follow. The following message is transmitted at the request of the United States Government. This is not a test. A nuclear attack has commenced against the United States. Fifteen nuclear bombs have detonated in several areas across the country. All residents within a 400-mile radius should seek a fallout shelter". After several terrifying minutes we determined it was a hoax, someone had played a YouTube video message over the VHF radio. Since we had been on our boats for a week and a half, and just going through an intense storm, we were tired and a bit more gullible than normal.

From Port Washington, we departed at 0600 and traveled southwest through the East River. We passed Rikers Island, the United Nations building, and the Empire State building. One of the boats hit 12.5 knots traveling through the treacherous Hell Gate, where the East River narrows, and water flows extremely fast and turbulent. The Statue of Liberty welcomed us to New York Harbor. We continued on passing under the magnificent Verrazzano-Narrows Bridge while continuing on to our final anchorage at Great Kills Harbor. The following morning, we departed at 0545 to complete the final 65 NM journey, just a few miles off the New Jersey Coast. Several boats ducked into the Manasguan River inlet to take the inside route, while the taller boats sailed down to Barnegat Inlet. We returned to Cedar Creek at around 1700. Dragon Fly and Island Breeze arrived several hours later. There was a great feeling of accomplishment for the captains and crew members as we finally tied up at Cedar Creek.

Prior to the trip, we had several captains' meetings to plan the trip. Joe DiGaetano did an excellent job at leading the trip and offering suggestions for ports of call. Everyone stayed safe and felt reasonably comfortable on the overnight passages. There was a sense of comradery among the 27 sailors as we made group decisions and problem solved. If you were not able to be part of this great journey, stay tuned, we are considering planning a 2023 Martha's Vineyard Trip.

6/11/2023


Our annual vessel safety check is schedule for June 11. Representatives from the Coast Guard Auxiliary will be performing the inspections.

Simple Beer Batter Recipe for Fish...or whatever

- 3 eggs
- ¾ cup beer
- 1 ½ cups milk
- 4 cups pastry flour
- 1 tablespoon baking powder
- ½ teaspoon baking soda
- 2 tablespoons cornstarch
- salt to taste
- ground black pepper to taste
- ½6 teaspoon garlic powder
- 1 ½ pounds cod fillets
- 2 quarts vegetable oil for frying



- In a medium bowl, stir together flour, baking powder, baking soda, and cornstarch.
- In a large bowl, beat together eggs and milk. Mix in beer. Stir in flour mixture. Season with salt, black pepper, and garlic powder.
- Coat fish in batter, and submerge in hot oil. Fry until golden brown, about 4 to 5 minutes.
